CITY OF CAYCE Regular Council Meeting July 5, 2016

The July Regular Council Meeting was held this evening at 6:00 p.m. in Council Chambers. Those present included Mayor Elise Partin, Council Members Tara Almond, Phil Carter, Eva Corley and James Jenkins. City Manager Rebecca Vance, Assistant City Manager Shaun Greenwood, Municipal Clerk Mendy Corder, Municipal Treasurer Garry Huddle, City Attorney Danny Crowe, and Director of Public Safety Byron Snellgrove were also in attendance.

Mayor Partin asked if members of the press and the public were duly notified of the Council Meeting in accordance with the FOIA. Ms. Corder confirmed they were notified.

Call to Order

Mayor Partin called the meeting to order. Council Member Almond gave the invocation and Mayor Partin led the assembly in the Pledge of Allegiance.

Approval of Minutes

Council Member Corley made a motion to approve the June 7, 2016 Regular Council Meeting minutes and the June 22, 2016 Special Council Meeting minutes as written. Council Member Almond seconded the motion which was unanimously approved by roll call vote.

Public Comment Regarding Items on the Agenda

No one signed up for Public Comment.

Presentations

A. Presentation of Whole Sole Awards

Mayor Partin asked Ms. Kay Hutchinson to join her in front of the assembly. She stated that Ms. Hutchinson was nominated by Mr. Shaun Greenwood for the City's Whole Sole Award. Mr. Greenwood wrote that the City of Cayce Public Safety Foundation had been instrumental in acquiring safety gear for the Public Safety Department. Tasers, bulletproof vests, chainsaws and other tools are just some of the items that have been purchased in the last few years. The Public Safety Foundation has hosted several events over the years to raise the money for these items. The Cayce Serves Tennis Tournament, held at the Cayce Tennis Center, has been the primary

event. Kay Hutchinson, a City employee, has been the driving force behind the tournament. Mr. Greenwood wrote that he has seen Kay work tirelessly to recruit volunteers, players and sponsors to ensure that the event is a success. Mayor Partin thanked Ms. Hutchinson for her dedication to the City.

Mayor Partin asked Ms. Mendy Corder to join her in front of the assembly. She stated that Mr. Greenwood also nominated Ms. Corder for the Whole Sole Award. In the nomination, Mr. Greenwood wrote that the City recently suffered a sudden loss with the passing of the Director of Planning and Development, Mr. Layne West. He stated that a number of employees went out of their way to ensure that Layne's family felt supported. Ms. Corder went the extra mile by helping the family coordinate retrieving Layne's personal items from City Hall. She also went as far as to help the family locate a funeral home here in the Midlands so they could have a service in South Carolina ensuring that Layne's three young children would be able to attend. Ms. Corder coordinated with the City's Sanitation Department to ensure that the process of cleaning out Mr. West's home was as painless as possible for the family. Mr. Greenwood wrote that he nominated Ms. Corder for her overwhelming compassion and her dedication to the employees of the City of Cayce.

Ordinances

A. Discussion and Approval of Ordinance 2016-09 Amending the Land Use Plan (2019) Map of the City of Cayce Comprehensive Plan: 2010-2020 – First Reading

Ms. Vance stated that Council approval is needed for the First Reading of an Ordinance to approve revisions to the City's Land Use Plan (2019) Map. She stated that the Comprehensive Plan is designed to be an adjustable document, fluctuating with the changes to the City. The request to amend the City of Cayce Land Use Map (2019), also known as the future land use plan, is to include map changes brought about by existing or future development. The outcome of the amendment involves changes to the map that must be included to process annexations and/or rezoning requests and for continued compliance with the goals of the Comprehensive Plan.

Ms. Vance stated that the Land Use Plan is one of the planning elements of the Cayce Comprehensive Plan. The corresponding map is meant to guide the systematic growth and development of the City. The zoning categories identified on the map are intentionally broad and are used to guide decisions on how the built environment will be shaped. She stated that the character of current and pending development within the City requires revisions to the map and eventually to the text of the Comprehensive Plan. This request will be the first in a series of changes to ensure the City is properly adjusting to future needs.

Ms. Vance stated that the specific changes proposed in the request were reclassifying the property immediately adjacent to the I-77 interchange on 12th Street from PMU (Planned Mixed Use) to TA (Transitional Area), adding three parcels of land off of Alex Drive and adding a designation of RD (Residential Density Flex), reclassifying four Residential lots on H Avenue from TA to RC (Residential Conservation/Infill), reclassifying property located adjacent to I-77 interchange and Charleston Highway from PMU to CBI (Commercial Business / Industrial), reclassifying two properties at the I-77 interchange and Bluff Road from PMU to CBI.

Ms. Vance stated that the Planning Commission considered the amendments to the Land Use Plan (2019) Map at a special called meeting on June 23, 2016. A Public Hearing was held at the meeting for public input. Residents from G and H Avenues did attend the Public Hearing and spoke in favor of the proposed changes. The Planning Commission unanimously recommended Council approve the requested amendments.

Council Member Carter made a motion to approve the First Reading of an Ordinance amending the Land Use Plan (2019) Map of the City of Cayce Comprehensive Plan: 2010-2020. Council Member Almond seconded the motion which was unanimously approved by roll call vote.

Other

A. Discussion and Approval of FY16/17 Memorandum of Agreement between the City of Cayce and the Department of Juvenile Justice's Detention Center

Council Member Jenkins made a motion to approve the FY16/17 Memorandum of Agreement between the City of Cayce and the Department of Juvenile Justice's Detention Center. Mr. Crowe stated that in years past the City had inserted language to the agreement regarding various technical disagreements with DJJ. He stated that this year DJJ sent a letter with the agreement stating that if any changes were made to the agreement then it would not be accepted. Mr. Crowe stated that he could write a cover letter stating the City's points of objection.

Mr. Crowe stated that in FY15/16 the City paid for nine juveniles to be detained at DJJ at a cost of \$4,200. He stated that the required State per diem is \$50 per day. Per the agreement the City is responsible for the cost to transport the juvenile to DJJ. Mr. Crowe stated that in the past staff struck through the section of the agreement that states that DJJ is not responsible for any medical treatment for preexisting medical issues. This was done so there would not be any implication that the City would be responsible. Mayor Partin asked if the cover letter would protect the City legally. Mr. Crowe stated that the Municipal Association of South Carolina contested these forced

charges years ago and the Legislature changed the law to buffer up the ability of DJJ to impose the agreement on municipalities.

Council Member Jenkins amended his motion and made a new motion to approve the memorandum with the suggested modifications by the City Attorney and authorize the City Manager to sign the agreement. Council Member Almond seconded the amended motion which was unanimously approved by roll call vote.

City Manager's Report

Ms. Vance stated that the improvements to Guignard Park are scheduled to be complete by the end of June. She stated staff still needed to pick a color for the new ping pong table but everything else is almost complete. She stated that the sign and plaque for the Kelley Jones Park in Riverland Park is in the process of being made.

Ms. Vance stated that the repair work for Phase I of the Riverwalk had begun. She stated that staff just received notice that Public Safety achieved a new and lower Insurance Services Office (ISO) rating of 3, improved from the previous rating of 4, for its firefighting capabilities. She stated that the lower the ISO rating in a community, the lower the insurance rate and cost of insurance will be. She stated that the City earned the improved rating based on a review of several parts of its public safety efforts including dispatch operations and 911 service, fire department training and equipment, and water availability and storage. She thanked Council for having the foresight to approve funds in the budget for new equipment for the Fire Department.

Committee Matters

Council Member Jenkins seconded the motion which was unanimously approved by roll call vote.

Council Member Almond stated that the April 12, 2016 Cayce Housing Authority minutes stated that a member was absent but also stated in the minutes that

the member made a motion at the meeting. Ms. Corder stated she would contact the staff liaison with Columbia Housing Authority to get clarification. Ms. Corley amended her motion to approve entering all the Committee minutes into the record except the April 12, 2016 Cayce Housing Authority minutes. Council Member Jenkins amended his second which was unanimously approved by roll call vote.

B. Appointments and Reappointments

Mayor Partin stated that Ms. Frankie Newman's position on the Events Committee expired in June and the Committee recommended her for reappointment. Council Member Carter made a motion to reappoint Ms. Newman to the Events Committee. Council Member Jenkins seconded the motion which was unanimously approved by roll call vote.

Mayor Partin stated that Mr. Larry Mitchell's term on the Planning Commission expires in July and he would like to serve again. Council Member Corley made a motion to reappoint Mr. Mitchell to the Planning Commission. Council Member Carter seconded the motion which was unanimously approved by roll call vote.

Mayor Partin stated that the Committees below had openings and asked the assembly to let their friends and neighbors know in case they are interested in serving on one.

WHOLE SOLE AWARD NOMINATION

Public Safety Dispatcher Tony Nelson was hired in September 2007. He has extensive knowledge of his duties and performs them flawlessly. He arrives 30-45 minutes early EVERY day and does not leave until his shift is complete. His work performance shows that he takes his job seriously and wants to do his best. Every time I compliment Tony on a job well done he always replies, "I'm just doing my job".

I feel Tony is deserving of the Whole Sole Award because he always goes above and beyond in every aspect of his duties. Tony covers 90% of the staffing issues in Dispatch. During December and January Tony worked a complete month of night shift to cover while another dispatcher was on vacation. He then returned to his normal shift for 2 days before going to a rotating 12 hour dayshift for 2 weeks while another dispatcher was in training. I have called Tony numerous times late at night or early in the morning to let him know a dispatcher would be out sick the following day. Tony almost always volunteers to come in early and stay late so the patrol division doesn't have to cover Dispatch. If Tony drops by Public Safety on the weekend to pick something up, he doesn't think twice about giving the on duty dispatcher a break.

Tony goes above and beyond to make sure Dispatch has proper coverage on a day to day basis. He also comes in early and stays late to make sure all personnel stay current with their NCIC certification. In June Tony moved from a Monday through Friday 8-5 schedule to rotating 12 hour split shifts to cover high volume call times. Tony stayed on that rotation until the week of July 4th to cover for another dispatcher who was on annual leave. Dispatcher Burgess recently retired and once again Tony volunteered to do "whatever was needed" to ensure seamless service to the citizens that call into the dispatch center.

It is for these reasons and many more that I think Tony Nelson should be a recipient of the "Whole Sole Award".

Subject: Approval of an Ordinance amending Section 4-11 of the Cayce City

Code to regulate drinking in public within the City limits.

ISSUE

Council approval is needed for the First Reading of an Ordinance amending Section 4-11 of the Cayce City Code to regulate drinking in public within the City limits.

BACKGROUND/DISCUSSION

A review of the City Code recently revealed some technical issues that needed to be resolved in regards to alcohol consumption at events and festivals. Section 4-11 needs to be amended to ensure there are no conflicts with consuming alcohol at outdoor festivals and events. The wording in the current ordinance would technically not allow for the consumption of alcohol outside of a building or structure. The Public Safety Director and City Attorney have reviewed the suggested amendment and believe the changes will serve the best interests of the City and the public.

Additionally, language was removed that would not allow alcohol from being consumed at establishments where the alcohol was produced. This in effect places significant burden on certain businesses like craft breweries.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends Council approve First Reading of an Ordinance amending Section 4-11 of the Cayce City Code to regulate drinking in public within the City limits.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and Council of the City of Cayce, in Council, duly assembled, that Section 4-11 ("Drinking in Public") of the City of Cayce General Code of Ordinances is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 4-11. - Drinking in public.

(a)

Except as allowed by Section 4-13, it shall be unlawful for any person to have in their possession any beer, wine, or alcoholic beverage in an open container, or in any container with a broken seal, in any public place within the corporate limits of the City of Cayce, except as provided herein below.

(b)

For the purposes of this section the term "public place" shall be defined as:

(1)

Any real property owned by any federal, state, county, or municipal government or any agency thereof; and

(2)

Any real property, regardless of ownership, which is open to members of the public, save and except real property where drinking is allowed pursuant to a permit or license from the State of South Carolina.

(c)

The prohibition provided in subsection (a) above, shall not be applicable to:

(1)

Any areas designated by city council as a special events area to include, but
not limited to, any public park, street sidewalk or any portion thereof, for
limited durations, and designated as the site of a public festival or other
special event; or

(2)
Any areas as designated in a special event or temporary use permit issued by the city.

This Ordinance shall be effective from the date of second and final reading.

Except as allowed by section 4-13, it shall be unlawful for any person within the city to:

Publicly engage in the drinking of alcoholic liquors, beer, ale, porter, wine or any other similar malt or fermented beverage, except within the business structure, house or building so licensed to sell such product for on-premises consumption.

BACKGROUND/DISCUSSION

Council approval is needed for the First Reading of an Ordinance to annex .70 acres of land located at 1416 Alex Street (TMS#005750-09-004), 1418 Alex Street (TMS#005750-09-005), and a property located at Naples Avenue (TMS#005750-09-015), Lexington County. The recommended zoning is RS-4 (Single Family, Small Lots).







ISSUE

Second Reading of an Ordinance to amend the Land Use Plan (2019) Map of the City of Cayce Comprehensive Plan: 2010-2020.

BACKGROUND/DISCUSSION

Council approval is needed for the Second Reading of an Ordinance to approve revisions to the City's Land Use Plan (2019) Map. The Comprehensive Plan is designed to be an adjustable document, fluctuating with the changes to the City. The request to amend the City of Cayce Land Use Map (2019), also known as the future land use plan, is to include map changes brought about by existing or future development. The outcome of the amendment involves changes to the map that must be included to process annexations and/or rezoning requests and for continued compliance with the goals of the Comprehensive Plan.

The Land Use Plan is one of the planning elements of the Cayce Comprehensive Plan. The corresponding map is meant to guide the systematic growth and development of the City. The zoning categories identified on this map are intentionally broad and are used to guide decisions on how the built environment will be shaped. The character of current and pending development within the City requires revisions to the map and eventually to the text of the Comprehensive Plan. This request will be the first in a series of changes to ensure the City is properly adjusting to future needs.

Detailed below are the specific changes proposed in this request:

- Reclassifying the property immediately adjacent to the I-77 interchange on 12th Street from PMU (Planned Mixed Use) to TA (Transitional Area)
- Adding three parcels of land off of Alex Drive and adding a designation of RD (Residential Density Flex)

- 4 Residential lots on H Avenue, reclassifying from TA to RC (Residential Conservation / Infill)
- Property located adjacent to I-77 interchange and Charleston Highway, reclassifying from PMU to CBI (Commercial Business / Industrial)
- 2 properties at the I-77 interchange and Bluff Road, reclassifying from PMU to CBI

The Planning Commission considered the amendments to the Land Use Plan (2019) Map at a special called meeting on June 23, 2016. A Public Hearing was held at the meeting for public input. Residents from G and H Avenues did attend the Public Hearing and spoke in favor of the proposed changes.





This agreement is made and entered into this 1st day of July, 2016, by and between the parties; Batesburg-Leesville Police Department, Cayce Department of Public Safety, Chapin Police Department, Columbia Airport Police Department, Gaston Police Department, Irmo Police Department, Lexington County Sheriff's Department, Lexington Police Department, Pelion Police Department, Pine Ridge Police Department, Springdale Police Department, Swansea Police Department and West Columbia Police Department.

WHEREAS, it is the desire and intent of the parties to evidence their joint undertaking for the provision of mutual assistance in criminal narcotics investigations by continued operation of a multi-jurisdictional task force within Lexington County, known as the Lexington County Multi-Agency Narcotics Enforcement Team (NET); the same having successfully operated continuously in the County since 2001; and,

WHEREAS, the General Assembly of the State of South Carolina, by legislation enacted into law on June 3, 2016, has amended and restructured Chapter 20, Title 23 of the Code of Laws of South Carolina, 1976, known as the "Law Enforcement Assistance and Support Act", so as to more completely describe the manner by which Mutual Aid Agreements, as that phrase is defined in said Act, can be established and operated; and,

WHEREAS, the parties as set out above, by and through their representatives affixing their signatures below, consent and agree to span the geopolitical boundaries of all areas of Lexington County to the fullest extent allowed under South Carolina law for the express purpose of investigating and prosecuting the illegal use and sale of controlled substances and other illegal drugs within the County. Herein set forth is the manner in which said Task Force shall be staffed and operated in order to comport with the amended Code section referenced above.

The officers of a law enforcement provider under this Agreement shall have the same legal rights, powers and the duties to enforce the laws of South Carolina as the law enforcement agency (Lexington County Sheriff) contracting for the services.

NOW THEREFORE, it is the intent of the parties, as it was under prior agreements in previous years, to share jurisdiction under this written agreement to the fullest extent permitted under South Carolina law and as further set forth herein.

1. SCOPE OF SERVICES

It is agreed that the law enforcement agency parties shall assign, on a temporary basis, officer(s) to participate in joint investigations with the Lexington County Multi-jurisdictional Narcotics Enforcement Team. Further, this agreement is intended to be in the nature of a request for assistance from adjacent jurisdictions.

This multi-jurisdictional effort is intended to combine resources of participating members of the Lexington County law enforcement community in an effort to combat the illegal narcotics trade, related criminal activities, and other crimes. It is the intent of this agreement to expand the jurisdiction of those law enforcement officers acting under this agreement throughout Lexington County to the greatest extent allowable by law. Any and all officers acting under and/or in accordance with this Agreement will have jurisdiction across and throughout Lexington County. This Agreement is in no way intended to limit, inhibit, or control any other expansion of jurisdiction which may be allowable under law; nor to effect any other agreements that may be in place between the parties.

2. FINANCIAL AGREEMENT

Each party to this Agreement shall bear its own costs incurred in the performance of its obligations hereunder, except as otherwise provided herein. The parties shall be solely responsible for the acts and omissions of their respective employees, officers, and officials. No right of indemnification is created by this Agreement and the parties expressly disclaim such. The provision of this Agreement shall not be deemed to give rise to or vest any rights or obligations in favor of any party or entity not a party to this Agreement.

3. VESTING OF AUTHORITY AND JURISDICTION

To the fullest extent permitted by the Constitution and statutes of this State, officers assigned under this Agreement and so transferred shall be vested with authority, jurisdiction, rights, immunities, and privileges to include the authority to execute criminal process and the power of arrest as any other duly commissioned officer of any other party so long as they are acting with the knowledge and approval of a Lexington County Narcotics Enforcement Team supervisor or are participating in an approved Narcotics Enforcement Team investigation. Moreover, each party shall deal with any legal contingencies for any lawsuits or the payment of damages arising from the services it renders to the Narcotics Enforcement Team. However, local ordinances adopted by a sending jurisdiction shall not be deemed extended into areas of operation that are located outside the geopolitical territorial limits of the sending jurisdiction. Each jurisdiction shall maintain its own insurance coverage for general liability, workers' compensation, and any other such coverage as may be required by law or deemed advisable by individual parties.

4. COMPENSATION, BOND, AND RELATED MATTERS

This agreement shall in no manner effect or reduce the compensation, pension or retirement rights of any officers acting under its authority and such officers shall continue to be paid by the county or the municipality where they are permanently employed, with the sending county or municipality being compensated for their services by the county or municipality to which they are transferred as further set out herein. The bond for any officers operating under this agreement shall include coverage for their activity in the county or municipality covered by this agreement in the same manner and to the same extent provide by bonds of regularly employed officers of that county or municipality.

5. REIMBURSMENT AND ANCILLARY BENEFITS

The parties to this agreement hereby expressly agree that compensation and/or reimbursement for services provided hereunder shall be limited to the reciprocal provision of services of like kind between the agencies involved to include the ancillary benefits of increased investigations and prosecution of narcotics offenses in the whole of Lexington County. Any agreement for sharing forfeiture proceeds among jurisdictions must be in writing between the

jurisdictions participating at the time of the underlying arrest. As a further benefit to all participants, the Sheriff of Lexington County shall provide office space for the adequate needs of the Multi-Agency Narcotics Enforcement Unit hereby established.

6. TERMINATION AND RIGHT TO RESCIND

The participation of any party may be terminated at the discretion of its chief law enforcement officer by providing written notice to all other parties. Any such rescission or termination will become effective upon receipt by the other parties. The election of any party or parties to exercise this right to rescind does not in any way affect the rights, duties, privileges, immunities, or obligations of the other parties.

7. RESPONSIBILITY TO RESPECTIVE GOVERNING BODIES

Each party is responsible for any notice, reporting, or approval requirements to/of their respective governing body as may be required under South Carolina law.

8. SEVERABILITY

Should any part of this agreement be found to be unenforceable by any court or other competent authority, the rest shall remain in full force and effect.

9. AMENDMENTS AND BINDING SUCCESSORS IN OFFICE

This Agreement may be amended by the written approval of all parties. Each party agrees that any and all successors in interest to their office will be similarly bound by the terms of this Agreement without necessitating execution of any amendment.

10. RECORDS TO BE KEPT

Complete records of the activities of the Narcotics Enforcement Team shall be kept by members of the Team, under the supervision of the supervisory officers of the Lexington County Narcotics Enforcement Team. The supervisor or his/her designee shall make a report of such activities on a bi-monthly basis to a gathering of the Chiefs of those Departments who are participants/signatories to this Agreement.

11. PROCESSING OF FREEDOM OF INFORMATION ACT REQUESTS

It is expressly agreed that the Multi-Jurisdictional Narcotics Enforcement Unit hereby created will appropriately and timely respond to all Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) requests made.

THE HOUSING AUTHORITY OF THE CITY OF CAYCE, S.C. April 12th, 2016

The Board of Commissioners of The Housing Authority of the City of Cayce, S.C. convened at 5:15 P.M., Tuesday, April 12th, 2016 in the Cayce Museum.

The Chairman called the meeting to order and upon roll call, those present and absent were as follows:

PRESENT: Jack L. Sightler, Jr., Chairman

Bruce Smith, Chair-Elect Janice Mixon, Commissioner Gilbert Walker, Secretary

ABSENT: Silvia Sullivan, Commissioner

STAFF: Howard Thomas, Lee McRoberts, Arthur Robertson,

Nancy Stoudenmire, Donzell Mitchell, Shate Griffin

Mr. Smith opened with a prayer.

Upon motion of Mrs. Mixon, seconded by Mr. Smith the minutes of the regular and annual meetings held February 16, 2016 were unanimously approved.

Mr. Robertson gave the Operations Report for February, March and April. He stated that no accounts were sent to the Magistrate, there were no accounts over thirty days old, 24 work orders were received in February, 20 received in March and 5 to date in April, 24 were completed in February, 20 completed in March and 1 completed to date in April. No emergency work orders were received.

Officer Bennett gave a briefing on security. All were minor. Once incident involved a resident that was subleasing his unit; the resident will be evicted.

Mrs. Stoudenmire presented the 2016 - 2017 Agency Plan. The format for the Plan changed and submission documents have been changed based on the PHA's size and performance designation. Staff has been working on the plan all year long and will submit by April 18, 2016 per HUD guidelines.

Cayce is a High Performing PHA with an inventory of 41 units. There are 12 1 bedroom units, 12 2 bedroom units, 13 3 bedrooms and 4 4 bedroom units.

There are currently 456 applications are currently on file for Cayce, which is down from 1,049 applications last year. Two and three bedroom units are the most requested. The average family size is 2.64 and the average family income is \$32,072.

There are 3 major changes to the Admissions and Continued Occupancy Policy this year; smoke free public housing, inappropriate bedroom size and over income families. Cayce received a good audit for 2015 and is operating on a budget of \$212,630 annually.

Several residents in Cayce have achieved homeownership and staff is currently working with other families who wish to purchase homes.

Incident reports increased by 2 compared to the previous year, there were 19 crimes in 2015 versus 17 in 2014. Staff continues to work closely with local law enforcement.

The Violence Against Women Act was changed to include sexual assault, provided clearer definitions, established time periods and was expanded to include the HOPWA, Homeless and other housing programs.

Goals and objectives for the Agency are increasing the number of affordable housing units in the community, promoting self-sufficiency of the residents and ensuring fair housing for all citizens.

The possible disposition of the 2 acres at Spencer Place was included in case an opportunity arises to develop that land. RAD was explored but decided not to be a benefit to Cayce.

All certifications required to be submitted with the plan have been completed. The Resident Advisory Board met on April 8th and was received the Plan favorably. The conversion to Smoke Free was the biggest topic of discussion and all residents in attendance at the RAB meeting were in favor of the policy.

Smoke free will be implemented in Cayce beginning July 1, 2016; all units in the Columbia Housing Authority's inventory will be smoke free by December, 2017. Smoking will no longer be allowed in public housing units or within 25 feet of buildings. Staff is working with LRADAC and other agencies to provide resources to residents wanting to quit.

Mrs. Stoudenmire opened the floor to comments or questions. There was a general discussion regarding the implementation of smoke free. Mr. Robertson said that staff is looking at outside options for smokers now and will provide some sort of shelter that meets the requirements of the regulations.

Upon motion of Mr. Sightler, seconded by Mr. Smith, the Annual Plan was unanimously approved.

Mr. Thomas stated that HUD inspections have been scheduled for the Cayce Housing Authority the 1st and 2nd of June. Approximately 15-20 homes will be selected randomly. Staff is generating work orders on units now to correct any possible issues.

Mr. Sightler asked for an update on the possible purchase of Judge Green's property. Mrs. Stoudenmire said staff is still interested but the Lexington County Director of Community Development recently left and the new Director has not been briefed on the proposal. Ms. Stoudenmire said that she will meet with him to explain the project and request additional funds in the new fiscal year.

I. CALL TO ORDER

The meeting was called to order by Chair Ed Fuson. Members present were John Raley, Larry Mitchell, Robert Power, and Chris Jordan. Chris Kueny and Butch Broehm were absent excused. Staff present were Shaun Greenwood and Monique Ocean.

II. APPROVAL OF MINUTES

A motion was made by Mr. Raley to approve the minutes of the May 16, 2016, meeting. Mr. Mitchell seconded the motion. The vote passed unanimously.

III. STATEMENT OF NOTIFICATION

Mr. Fuson asked if the media and the public had been duly notified of the public hearing. Monique Ocean confirmed that everyone had been notified.

IV. PUBLIC HEARING – Text Amendment [Amendment of the Land Use Plan (2019) Map to include changes that have been brought about by existing or future development]

a. Opening Statement

Mr. Greenwood begin by giving general information on the reasons for the special called meeting. Mr. Greenwood explained that amendments must be made to the future Land Use Plan map for continued compliance with the Cayce Comp Plan. Mr. Greenwood went on to explain several issues in the map that are not compliant with the goals of the plan and he discussed reclassifying these areas. Mr. Greenwood discussed the following proposed amendments:

- Reclassifying the property immediately adjacent to the I-77 interchange on 12th Street from PMU (Planned Mixed Use) to TA (Transitional Area),
- Adding three parcels of land off of Alex Drive and adding a designation of RD (Residential Density Flex),
- 4 Residential lots on H Ave. reclassifying from TA to RC (Residential Conservation / Infill),
- Property located adjacent to I-77 interchange and Charleston Highway reclassifying from PMU to CBI (Commercial Business / Industrial) and
- 2 properties at the I-77 interchange and Bluff Road reclassifying from PMU to CBI.

Mr. Greenwood stated that the amendments would also involve changes to the map that must be included to process rezoning or annexation requests.

b. Public Testimony

The following people came before the Commission to speak in favor of the request for amendments to the future Land Use Plan map:

- 1. Nancy Stone-Collum of 1222 H Avenue,
- 2. Janice Geiger-West of 1211 G Avenue and
- James Orefice and Carol Drabik of 1225 G Avenue.

Mrs. Stone-Collum stated that she and her husband discovered that their property was zoned as a commercial district when they were denied a building permit to add an extension to their single family home. Mrs. Stone-Collum stated she has lived in the home for 39 years and had no idea that it was not residentially zoned. Mrs. Stone-Collum explained that she was also told that the property was not eligible to go before the Planning Commission for rezoning to a residential zoning district because the request would not comply with the future Land Use Plan.

Mr. Greenwood explained that this is an example of why the future Land Use Plan map must be amended to process annexations or rezoning requests and for continued compliance with the Comp Plan. Mr. Greenwood pointed out that the zoning on H and G Avenues caused the properties to be legal non-conforming uses and hinders the owners' ability for additions or major remodels to the homes. Mr. Greenwood stated that the properties were not eligible for rezoning to residential districts because of issues with the future Land Use Plan map. Mr. Greenwood stated that residential zoned districts are not compatible with the land use classification shown on the map, therefore a request for rezoning to a residential zoning district would have to be denied. Mr. Greenwood stated that properties on H and G Avenues are located in a typical single family residential area and he believes the intent is for them to be residential zoned districts.

c. Adjourn Hearing

With no further discussion, the public hearing was closed by Chair Ed Fuson.
