

City Reflections

A Letter from Mayor Elise Partin

A decade is a long time, but two big things happen every 10 years in Cayce: the Census and a new Comprehensive Plan.

Every City is mandated by law to have a Comprehensive Plan, that outlines a long-range vision for growth, but for most this plan sits on a shelf and is rarely referred to, until it has to be updated. In Cayce, as you know, that's not how we do business. The 2010 Comprehensive Plan was put together with substantial citizen input and is required to be reviewed and updated each year by Council and staff, to ensure we are staying consistent with it. This means that your voice is what has guided us over the last 10 years. We have accomplished so much in that time because, when facing a decision, we followed the vision you set forth within the Comprehensive Plan and didn't simply view it as a box we had to check. See the article in this newsletter that tells you about an upcoming input session. As we embark on creating our 2020 plan, we need your input.

The Census is also coming up and is SO important to us. We need EVERY Cayce resident to be counted. If we miss you, it will have huge consequences for you and our City. Your political power would be diminished because state and federal representation is based on population numbers. There will be less funding for things like health care services, education programs and bridges and roads. Our economies could also suffer. Businesses use census data to make \$4 trillion in annual private investment decisions. And the information helps them decide where to build, invest in other businesses and what to sell to whom. Utility companies use it to influence where they add infrastructure and invest in new technology.

The Constitution mandates the



Census Bureau achieve a fair and accurate count of every person living in the United States – regardless of ethnicity, immigration status, income level or ZIP code. Strict privacy and confidentiality protections allow our communities to be counted without fear. The laws that protect the confidentiality of census responses are ironclad. Those who fear opening their doors can be counted online, by phone and through communitybased efforts.

Join us as we continue to talk about these important pieces of our City. We value your input.

Comprehensive Plan Update

In 2010, the City of Cayce completed its 10-year Comprehensive Plan, which laid out multiple goals for how Cayce should grow in the next ten years. Since then, these goals have served as a road map for the City and much has been accomplished along the journey to arrive to where we are now. New water lines have been installed throughout the neighborhoods; Knox Abbott Drive is undergoing a major transformation in safety and beauty; several City parks have been renovated; the Cayce Riverwalk is completed and drawing thousands each year to experience nature in the heart of a busy urban area; and many new businesses and residents have moved in to call Cayce home.

Public Safety Recognized

Cayce Department of Public Safety, led by Director Byron Snellgrove, received the distinguished recognition of becoming a South Carolina State Accredited Agency on June 7. The South Carolina Law Enforcement Accreditation Program, an initiative of the S.C. Police Chiefs' Association and the S.C. Sheriffs' Association, is designed to demonstrate a commitment to professional law enforcement practices. The process of becoming accredited is a lengthy and complex review of all practices, procedures, and policies inside the department. The accreditation process has been completed by approximately 25 departments in South Carolina; Cayce being the most recent.

City News

On Monday, October 7, from 6 to 8 p.m., residents are invited to a police-community partnership event to help make neighborhoods safer. Officers will be joined by local organizations and businesses that will offer free food. educational information and other family-friendly displays. Around Town

Election Date Change Staff with the Lexington County Board of Voter Registration and Elections appeared before Cayce City Council at their May 7 meeting and requested the City change its current election date for Mayor and Council from the Federal and State general election date in November of even-numbered years to November in odd-numbered years. At that time, Cayce was one of only two municipalities that held its elections in evennumbered years. Lexington County felt that changing the elections would simplify the administration of elections, simplify training of local election officials by the State Election Commission, and save election official's time and resources by eliminating duplication of efforts associated with different election dates.

As with any change of this magnitude, City staff thoroughly researched how the change would affect you, the voters, and found that moving election dates to odd-numbered years would better provide for the efficiency, transparency and accountability for regularly-scheduled elections. Council voted at the June 19, 2019 Council Meeting to amend City Code to move the date for elections of Mayor and Council to November in odd-numbered years.

BENEFITS

- » Voters will know when their elections are held since they will be held separately from State and Federal Elections.
- November of odd-numbered years will become a statewide election day resulting in more media coverage of municipal

- elections.
- This new, odd-numbered year Election Day should result in improved voter education on the process, the issues and the candidates.
- The net result of the focus that comes with a common election date should be greater participation.
- » Greater focus and attention improves transparency in elections.
