

A Letter from Mayor Elise Partin

I recently had the pleasure of visiting with a 99-year-old Cayce resident. She is beautiful inside and out and has a memory that blew me away. I was so amazed by the details she remembered from her childhood growing up in Cayce. She told me stories from when she was in elementary school and even remembered her teacher's name! She told me about how at the beginning of World War II, soldiers would be on the train going into Columbia to get processed to join the fight and if there was a backup of trains, the train would stop on the tracks by State Street. She would talk with the soldiers while they waited and reminisced about the man who owned the corner restaurant and how happy he was when the trains stopped there because he knew he would sell a lot of hamburgers. I learned so much about the businesses and residents from long ago.

Cayce is blessed to have many residents who have spent most of their lives here. And we are so grateful that so many new people recognize that this is a

great place to move to. Keeping a city great doesn't happen by accident. Focusing on quality of life is Cayce City Council's goal - and it's something we've done well – so much so that when we had our city rebranding a few years ago, the overwhelming community input was that there is Time for Life here in Cayce.

The Congaree were early Native Americans of the Colonial Period. These huntergatherers ate fish, deer and other wild game, and also grew corn, beans and squash, known as the "Three Sisters Method of Farming." The Congaree were estimated to be less than 1,000 people when first encountered by the English. In 1701, John Lawson, an Englishman traveling in both the Backcountry of North and South Carolina visited the tribe. His 1709 book gives us a snapshot of the people living in the Cayce area in the early 18th century. Learn more about this tribe at the Cayce Historical Museum.

"The Town consists not of above a dozen Houses, they having other stragling Plantations up and down the Country, and are feated upon a small Branch of Santee-River. The Congerees are kind and affable to the English, the Queen being very kind, giving us what Rarities her Cabin afforded, as Loblolly made with Indian Corn, and dry'd Peaches."
