Cayce Museum Opens New Exhibit

The Cayce Historical Museum has opened its newest changing exhibit titled "Air Base to Airfield: The Story of the Columbia Metropolitan Airport." This fascinating exhibit narrates the development of the former Columbia Army Air Base into the Columbia Metropolitan Airport. The exhibit highlights three eras of the airport and military operations during World War II is the beginning of the exhibit's three phases. This is where volunteers for Doolittle's Raid gathered before heading to Eglin Air Base for training. After the war, in 1947 commercial operations were introduced. In 1965, CAAB was officially renamed Columbia Metropolitan Airport.

Cayce Fire Department Launches TEA Program

Cayce's Community Risk Reduction Manager Lindsay McDade with the Cayce Fire Department launched a study the first week of March in partnership with The Courage Center and Hoof Beat Ranch. The study will provide data on the Therapeutic Equine Activities (TEA) program focused on supporting individuals in recovery while improving overall mental wellness. The TEA program is funded by South Carolina Opioid Recovery Funds (SCORF).

HISTORY

Through the Muffin Cares program Animal Assisted Interventions with Muffin the Therapy Horse have become a huge success. Muffin helped starthe conversation on why overdose is the number one cause of accidenta death in Lexington County. Opioid Use Disorder (OUD) touches people among all demographics; and the awareness campaign includes the dangers of fake pills, disposing of unwanted medications and the impact of addiction.

PROGRAM DEVELOPMENT

Horses are prey animals, meaning they are on the constant lookout for danger. They live in the moment and are very perceptive of body language and nonverbal communication. They can play a key role in addressing the stigma of mental health. Muffin Cares expanded to the TEA program to provide support for individuals in recovery and teach mental health resiliency skills. Participants are educated through the horse and human partnership on mindfulness, emotional self-regulation, self-care, and problem solving, to name a few.

The program is currently being piloted at the Lexington location of The Courage Center and was recently featured on WLT) and WIS.

Bruce Wade began his career at the Evans Correctional Center in Bennettsville, SC in 1998 as a Correctional Officer. He worked with the West Columbia Police Department beginning in 2005; where he was named Police Captain over Investigations in 2012 before being named the Assistant Chief in 2021. Through a partnership between the City of West Columbia and the City of Cayce, Wade has served in an advisory role at the City of Cayce Police Department over the last three months and officially started with the City of Cayce on April 15.

DPH and DMH Make Move to Cayce



Know Your Flood Risk

The City of Cayce is home to numerous streams, creeks, and the Congaree River. While these bodies of water are often scenic and offer numerous opportunities for recreation, they also come with the potential hazard for flooding. The City of Cayce participates in the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) which requires that the City has a Flood Damage Prevention Ordinance that regulates construction or renovations on properties located in special flood hazard areas. Owners of properties located within these areas should check with the City of Cayce's Planning and Development Department if they plan on performing any repairs, renovations, additions, or any new construction within these areas to make sure that the ordinance requirements for flood damage prevention are being met. If a resident lives in areas subject to flooding, being prepared is very important in order to protect property and lives. Here are a few things that property owners can do to help make sure that property damage is kept to a minimum.

- 1. Check with the City's floodplain manager to find out details of their property such as base flood elevation.
- 2. Have a flood plan that includes shutting off utilities to the property such as electricity and gas services and an evacuation plan.
- 3. Purchase a flood insurance policy. Regular homeowners' insurance does not cover flood damage and most FEMA grant funds require a flood insurance policy be in effect at the time the damage occurred.
- 4. Protect natural floodplain functions. Maintain stormwater drains and detention areas to allow the floodplain to function as it should
- 5. Consider permanent flood protection measures such as elevating the structure 1 foot above the base flood elevation and elevating utilities such as electrical panels and central air conditioning/heating units.

Any residents with questions regarding their property in a flood hazard area may contact Stuart Jones, the City of Cayce's Floodplain Manager at 803-550-9502. Being aware and being prepared go a long way in protecting properties and lives.
